Their Inheritance

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This guide offers a ten lesson study and devotional for the book, *Their Inheritance*.

There will be discussion questions and worksheets to provoke thoughts and Bible research based on the life lessons, family values, and scripture used throughout the book.

Memory verse: Psalm 23

Read Scripture: Psalm 121

Adversity is defined as difficulties or misfortune. We all face adversity in our lives at some point. Maybe someone you love has died. Maybe your family has experienced the loss of a job or experienced financial problems. Could be you struggle in school or you do not feel like you have any friends. Maybe you feel alone or that no one understands you. Regardless of age or social standing, everyone faces adversity. When you have had adversity in your life, who or what did you turn to for help?

Their Inheritance depicts sixteen-year-old Alexandra at the burial site of her parents. Her mother is being buried just two weeks after her father. Can you imagine how she must feel? Instead of giving into her feelings of anger, hurt, frustration, or fear, Alexandra trusts in God, her brother James, and the family's Christian friends. During their first devotion together following the funeral, seventeen-year-old James reads from Psalm 121 verse 2, "My help cometh from the Lord, which made the heaven and the earth."

The foundation of this verse is the fact that God is the creator of all things and therefore who better or more powerful to trust in during times of difficulty?

If you have faith and believe that God is the creator of all things, then surely you can turn to Him for help during any trial in your life.

Another way that God sees us through adversity is through the help of family and Christian friends. In the book excerpt, neighbors offer comfort and assistance. Throughout the book, the siblings lean on each other and often receive help from Christian friends at unexpected times. Also, Alexandra and her siblings help each other through these difficult times by offering a kind word, a meal, scripture references, praying with each other, or simply by listening. According to God's Word we are to bear one another's burdens and love our neighbor as ourselves.

Things to consider:

Describe an adversity that you have been through in your own life and how you got through it. Was your faith increased or decreased? Was there a particular Bible verse that helped you?

How do you feel about the fact that God does not promise us a problem-free life? Or that we do not always know why things happen to us or to the ones we love?

Do you believe that God is with you in any adversity? How does that make you feel? Have you had others help you through adversity? How did you feel when others helped you? Have you helped others through difficult times and how did that make you feel? From this lesson, what have you learned about dealing with adversity?

In chapter 1 *The Gathering*, we find Alexandra standing at her mother's grave. The author draws a picture with her words, not only of the atmosphere, but also of the character's feelings. Discuss how adjectives are used to paint the picture of the scene.

The characters from this book, <i>Their Inheritance</i> , teach us many things about life and more specifically Christian life. At the center of their lives is their faith. Their faith in God is what sustains them through the difficult times they face and gives them direction in making difficult decisions. Their faith causes them to constantly pray and to daily read the scripture for comfort and direction. Their faith calls them to obedience to God's Holy
Spirit, whether sending for a doctor for a friend or preparing for a storm.

Organize is defined as to arrange in or according to a system. Alexandra and James began focusing on their life by remaining in the customs and rituals of their parents. Their family order had been disrupted, so they chose to adhere to structure to reduce the stress they were dealt. Organization helps to keep focus to the task at hand.

Are you organized in your school work? Is there a project you are or have been working? Are you organized? If not, how would organization help you? If you are organized, how has it helped you?

Part of being organized is to adhere to a schedule. James and Alexandra's family had always begun each day with devotions and ended their day in the same way. Together they read the Bible, discussed the meaning of the scriptures, and prayed together. James and Alexandra both had concerns about their future. They shared doubts in their abilities and maturity to handle the farm and the raising of Christine and Lee. They both turned to scripture for assurance, guidance, and aide. In times of heartache or personal struggle, that small voice spoke to Alexandra. What is that 'small voice'?

Matthew 11:28 states 'Come unto me all ye that labour and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest.' This scripture let them know that they did not have to handle the heavy burdens of worry alone. James and Alexandra both found peace to handle their grief. Have you felt that sense of peace in your life? If so, when?

Throughout the Bible we are assured that we are not alone. James and Alexandra sat alone on the evening after their mother's funeral after their younger siblings were in bed. As Alexandra questioned why Ma and Pa died, James did what his parents had taught him. He opened his father's Bible to a familiar passage (*Psalm 23*) and read. James explained to Alexandra that they must pray and wait. He reminded her that the Bible says to trust God. Throughout *Their Inheritance*, James and Alexandra had morning and evening devotions (Bible readings and prayer). They also had quiet unplanned prayer throughout the day. Without their diligent prayer life and dependence on God's Word, James and Alexandra would have most likely been overcome with grief. Just as they prayed and read their Bible daily, so should we.

Happiness is defined as a state of well-being and contentment. Christians should be the happiest people on earth. The fact that our sins are forgiven and we have the promise of eternal life should keep a permanent smile on our faces. How did you feel when you first became a Christian? It is likely that your joy and happiness knew no bounds. Too often, over time, our happiness gets buried beneath the cares of life. From time to time, we all need to go back in our lives and remember what it was like when we were new Christians.

The scripture for this lesson is taken from the book of Acts. This passage describes the early Christians and how they interacted with each other. The scripture says that they ate together, were of one heart, and praised God together. Spending time together in worship and fellowship is a key ingredient for a Christian's happiness as well as spiritual health. If you do not spend time with fellow Christians, then you are more likely to be adversely affected by the burdens of life. The happiest times in life occur when you are interacting with others. Conversely, times of struggle occur when you are isolated.

Alexandra and James were faced with an invitation for go off and have fun with their friends. Neither James nor Alexandra accepted the invitation. Over time, they came to realize life cannot be all work and no play. Alexandra reminded James that their Pa worked hard and handled his responsibilities, yet still liked to have fun and laugh at times also. Life is not meant to be all work and no play. The book of Ecclesiastes teaches us that there is a time for everything, including fun and laughter.



Relationship is defined as a state of connection existing between beings. All relationships require spending time together and communicating. If you and your best friend did not see each other for a long period of time or you did not talk for a long period, your relationship will likely weaken. Another example is a relationship between a husband and wife. One of the main reasons that marriages fail is a lack of communication between the spouses. If we stop our communication (praying) with God, then our relationship with Him becomes weak. Conversely, a strong prayer life will lead to a strong bond (relationship) with God. The key verse tells us to pray without stopping. A prayer does not have to be long or full of big fancy words. A prayer can be as simple as "Help me Lord." But it can also be as long as you need it to be to pour your heart out to Him. The Bible teaches us to not use vain words when praying, but to let our spirits commune with God. Sometimes we can be so happy or so distraught that we do not know what to say. At those times, we must let our spirit communicate with God. Prayer is a Christian life's blood.

Reading the Bible is a Christian's food. Similar to praying, a Christian must read and study the Bible in order to have a strong relationship with God. If a Christian does not read his Bible, how does he know how to live? Just like a worker receives instructions on how to do a job or a driver reads a map to see how to get to his destination; a Christian must read his Bible. As an example to us, the gospels tell us how often Jesus studied the scripture and prayed. If Jesus had to study and pray, then how much more time should we spend in prayer and reading God's Word?

Even though we have a personal relationship with Christ and we rely on that still small voice to guide us, there are times when we need guidance from other Christians. This goes back to the need for fellowship and surrounding yourself with fellow Christians. There are times we need help.

Reliance is defined as the act of placing faith or confidence in someone or something. To rely on something or someone, you must believe or trust them. Thus, you will have faith in them. Alexandra and James' reliance on the Lord made them strong. Not just emotionally strong, but physically strong. Worry or anguish causes the physical body, our immune system, to become weak and vulnerable. James turned to prayer, his communication with the Lord, as a way of healing emotionally and as a way to handle his fears and questions about their daily lives, as well as the future. As small children, you rely on your parents for everything. As a teenager, you begin to make more decisions for yourselves. You rely on your parents' instruction and the values they have taught you, but it is at this time you need to rely on the Holy Spirit for more instructions. Soon, as you get into adulthood, you will rely completely on the Lord's guidance for your daily decisions. Have you been tempted by peer pressure? How did you handle it? Did you make the decision on your own or did you rely on God's guidance? How did the situation turn out?



Labor is defined as to move with great effort. Life requires us to work not only in order to stay in shape physically and to provide for the nourishment of our bodies, but also to be a productive member of our society. If James, Alexandra, Christine, or Lee refused to work, then the family would have been without food, the land would have gone to waste, the house would have been filthy, and the animals would have perished. The Bible states in 2 Thessalonians 3: 10 'For even when we were with you, this we commanded, that if any would not work, neither should he eat.' The Bible also tells us in Proverbs 23: 4, 'Labour not to be rich; cease from thy own wisdom'

As children, you work to be obedient to your parents. This includes chores, school work, and instruction in your daily life. As you grow and mature, your relationship with your parents serves as an example to your forming a relationship with Christ. As we must all physically work or labor on this earth to provide and function in society, we must also labor in our Christian life. Just as James read his Bible, knelt in prayer, and listened to the call of God in his life, we must labor in building and tending to the growth of our relationship with God.

What are some ways you can work on your Christian existence? Can you physically work your way into heaven? By simply being a hard working, nice person; does that make you a follower of Christ? After a hard day of physical labor, how do you feel? Though physically tired, you feel a sense of accomplishment. The same feelings can be felt after a day filled with Christ-like devotion and labor in your spiritual work on your relationship with Christ.

Longsuffering is defined as to be patient and to endure for a long time. Through all of their heartache, tragedy, hard work, and temptations, James and Alexandra exude longsuffering or great patience. This faithfulness gives them both a sense of accomplishment, a personal strength emotionally, a strong steadfastness, forbearance, and inner peace. Longsuffering is a Christ-like virtue. Galatians 6: 2 tells us, 'Bear ye one another's burdens, and so fulfill the law of Christ.' To be patient and to endure also means to help others who are in need or are suffering. When Monica sees Alexandra physically weary, she tries to step in and help her with her chores. She also spends extra time in prayer for her sister-in-law. The longsuffering or patience of a Christian comes from the habit of prayer and commitment. Once you establish yourself as a Christian, it is necessary to have a habit of prayer and devotion. These habits strengthen your relationship with Christ. Not only will your heart be filled with peace and joy, but your mind will be Christ-like oriented. When your thoughts are filled with His word, your heart will be established with His will.

Fear is defined as to have a reverent awe or an unpleasant strong emotion caused by an awareness of danger. We will be discussing the second definition of fear, the emotion that is caused by an awareness of danger. Monica is fearful for Alexandra's health and yet she does not give in to her fears. Instead of letting her fears paralyze her, she prayerfully tries to help improve Alexandra's health by doing more work so Alexandra can get the rest that she needs. Monica sees chores that might strain Alexandra, so without asking or waiting to be asked, she steps up and completes the chores to ease Alexandra's daily load. God has given us the emotion of fear so that we can flee danger. An example of this is when we see a snake; most of us become fearful which causes us to flee from the snake so we will not be bitten. However, we should not be so fearful of snakes so that we can't sleep at night for fear that we will see a snake the next day. Fear should spur us to action but it should not paralyze us.




